RESOLUTION PROVIDING FOR THE SALE OF \$2,000,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION PROMISSORY NOTES

WHEREAS the City of Berlin, Green Lake and Waushara Counties, Wisconsin (the "City") is presently in need of approximately \$2,000,000 for the public purpose of paying the cost of street improvements and other capital projects included in the City's budget; and

WHEREAS it is desirable to borrow the funds needed for such purpose through the issuance of general obligation promissory notes pursuant to Section 67.12(12), Wis. Stats.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that:

- 1. The City shall issue General Obligation Promissory Notes (the "Notes") in the amount of approximately \$2,000,000 for the purpose described above.
- 2. The sale of the Notes shall be negotiated with Robert W. Baird & Co. Incorporated ("Baird"), and the terms of the Notes, including the dating, interest rates, maturity schedule and other details with respect to the Notes, shall be subject to approval by subsequent resolution of the Common Council.
- 3. The City Clerk shall cause an Official Statement concerning the Notes to be prepared by Baird. The appropriate City officials shall determine when the Official Statement is final for purposes of Securities and Exchange Commission Rule 15c2-12 and shall certify said Statement, such certification to constitute full authorization of such Statement under this resolution.

RE: 218 S. Grove Street Raze or Repair Order

BACKGROUND:

In July of 2018 there was a house fire at 218 S. Grove Street and in January of 2019, the property was sold to Brian Wilson. Since then the building inspector sent a letter to Mr. Wilson in June of 2019, December of 2019, and April of 2020. Mr. Wilson did not respond to any of the letters so staff proceeded to work with the Police Department to issue him a citation. Citation was issued and had a court date on July 8, 2020. Mr. Wilson did not show up to court. As staff has tried several times to contact the property owner, there has been no response or work done to the property. Currently the value of the improvements on the parcel is \$22,000. With that staff recommends to proceed with a raze or repair order for 218 S. Grove Street.

RE: CARES Act Routes to Recovery Program

BACKGROUND: The CARES Act has a local government aid grant program called "Routes to Recovery". This program was created with funding from the federal CARES Act's Coronavirus Relief Fund, which may be used to reimburse necessary, unbudgeted expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 public health emergency. Every county, city, village and town in WI is allocated a portion of the program funds, which it can withdraw for eligible reimbursements during the program.

The funds can be used to cover expenditures that are necessary to respond to the public health emergency. The federal agency overseeing these funds gives discretion to local government officials to determine what is necessary to meet the public health emergency within their communities, provided they exercise reasonable judgment. Expenses are reported and the nature of the expense and how it relates to the public health emergency has to be described.

The CARES Act imposes four primary limitations on the use of the funds. They may only be used to reimburse (1) government expenditures that were (2) unbudgeted, (3) necessary to respond to the COVID-19 public health emergency, and (4) incurred on or after March 1 through November 6, 2020.

These funds cannot be used to: replace lost revenues, reimburse costs that were paid or reimbursed from other federal, state or third-party funding sources, or for routine maintenance costs.

There are many unbudgeted expenditures that the city has incurred due to COVID-19 to be reimbursed by this funding. This includes PPE equipment, sanitization supplies, thermometers, staff quarantine expenses, overtime, attorney expense, etc. We should look at anything additional we need to purchase to secure our public facilities under a public health emergency. Staff has been looking departmentally into what improvements could be made. The following items are for Council to consider (we are still getting costs together):

- Touchless bathroom fixtures for public areas (this alone can get very costly so we would likely look at the most used areas first)
- Powered Air Purifying Respirator (PAPR) for ambulances (9) \$18,000
- Touchless Election Machine Tabulator \$6,500-\$7,500
- Larger Absentee Ballot Box due to increased absentee voting \$250
- Stanchions for social distancing at elections/other
- Mobile laser UV sanitary light for sanitizing rooms
- Elevator air purifiers \$3,500
- Computer equipment for virtual meetings
- Power doors for City Hall entrance

This is the initial list we have determined and more may come to light in the next month or two. However, in order to move forward with any of these items in the next few months, Council has to officially deem them necessary unbudgeted expenses to address the public health emergency.

The City of Berlin's allocation is \$91,107. We already have approximately \$40K+ in expenses and there are still ongoing unbudgeted costs occurring for personnel, sanitization and PPE. We will reimburse those expenses first and any additional funds can be applied to the list that Council deems necessary. I am recommending Council review the list and deem these items, or other items Council desires, as necessary. It is unlikely we can afford all of the items on the list, so we will need to prioritize.

A word of caution... we need to be diligent and reasonable in any expenses as there will be a federal audit on this. Any expenditures considered to be unnecessary will not be covered and we would need to pay the grant back. There is no "pre-approval" process for any of this.

RE: Updates to Election Ordinances

<u>BACKGROUND</u>: There are two updates to the elections ordinance I would ask Council to consider regarding:

- 1) Split Shifts for Poll Workers: We have allowed split shifts for election workers in the past, but in reviewing the state statues we should have an ordinance that specifically allows it.
- 2) Minimum Number of Election Officials at Elections: The statute allows municipalities to adopt an ordinance to have as few as three poll workers at an election. Our current minimum required is five, but for a really low turnout election it would be advantageous to only require three.

<u>RECOMMENDATION:</u> Direct the City Attorney to draft ordinance changes regarding the minimum number of election officials required and establishing split shifts for election officials.
